


Notes -

Albert Payson Terhune knew Minbeam country well.  
Mr. William H. Rauchfuss curator of Hey Mansion wrote  
many articles for the Paterson Morning Call.

Wreelands of Macopin came from Holland 1636.  
The Stone family of Stonetown came here from Holland  
in the 1600's, and given their farmland in exchange  
for pasturing cattle.

You can get a list of some of our first settlers from  
the Pompton Reformed Church or from Historical Society.  
My great, great grandfather John Allen of Stonetown  
owned and operated the first sawmill in that section.

Uncle Slave Miller told me that some of the Miller  
property was bought from Indians & deed written on birch bark  
In Hackensack Courthouse in Index Room, Map  
shelf, Book P, Page 48, I found an old sheepskin  
deed 16 x 18 ins. written with pokeberry juice. The  
deed was between John Berry and Jeremiah Peck  
dated 1712 - The Seal 

I also found an interesting old Indian deed  
between Indians and the Ryerson family of these parts.  
I gave the copy I made to a member of the old  
Ryerson family.
